

- **4.** If Thérèse was a kid today, what three books do you think she'd like to read? Give a reason for each choice.
- **5.** Many women still aren't paid the same as men for doing the same job. Do you think this is fair? Give three reasons why or why not. Suggest an action you could take to change the situation for the better.
