Michael Martchenko Too Much Stuff!





What advice do you have for young illustrators?

My advice to young illustrators would be to study other artists work. Let yourself be influenced by them if you admire their work. You will eventually develop your own style. Plus, draw, draw, draw! Just take timeout to shower and eat once in a while!

What was your favourite book when you were growing up?

I didn't have many books when I was a kid. I liked the classics featuring coloured illustrations, such as *Treasure Island, Ivanhoe and Knights of the Round Table*. I loved comic books, they really piqued my interest in visual humour, which has come in very handy!
